[Draft minutes of our last meeting for approval at the March 17, 2017 luncheon.]

The Association of Oldest Inhabitants of the District of Columbia (AOI) held the first luncheon meeting of its 152<sup>nd</sup> year at the Capitol Skyline Hotel at noon Friday, February 17, 2017. President Bill Brown welcomed the attendees and called for approval of the notes of the November 2016 meeting, which were printed in the February newsletter noting that he had omitted AOI's recognition of out-going Director Damon Cordom. After a motion made by **Barbara Ioanes** and seconded by **Dudley Brown**, the minutes were approved with the correction and their reading was waived.

A motion was made by Rise Cole and seconded by Charles Szlinker to approve the new members and they were approved enthusiastically.

# New Year's Day Brunch

- The revival of our New Year's Day Brunch was a festive occasion and plans are underway for next year's event
- 42 members and guests attended

#### Membership Renewals

- Two-thirds, actually 69%, of our members have already renewed this year, plus five new members have joined.

#### President's Remarks:

Bill noted that 101 people were in attendance, a great start for the year, driven no doubt by a combination of the lecture topic and "cabin fever."

In a departure from past practice (out of fear of excluding someone), Bill said he would no longer call-out/identify "First Timers" at our events and just say whether someone was new to our organization or a returning member we haven't seen in a long time... A number of guests were welcomed and recognized: Barbara Bates had with her **Kate Dell**; Sally Berk had with her her

mom Betty Lichtenstein; Dudley Brown has as his guest, new member Daisy Mullett Smith. Bryant & Jonyce Cole, Carl's & Rise's grandson and granddaughter-in-law, were present; Jim Jones had with him Bill Dickinson; Anita Lee, who will be our speaker in September, had with her Raphael Branch; Lisa Nickerson had with her Robin Blackwood; Georgia Hall was Laurana Reed's guest; and we had with us two folks who are not yet members but we hope will join: Brigitta Sunderland and Amy Joseph, who are working on an Adolf Cluss project and were brought to AOI by member Joseph Browne, now living in Colorado.

Both Hulit Taylor and Bill had nice notes from Vince Scalco's family in response to the sympathy notes they had sent on the AOI's behalf. Bill read the Scalco family's responding note of appreciation.

The AOI continues to provide comments on Pershing Park as both the NCPC and CFA are hosting briefings by the designers and accept comments from "Consulting Parties" (not the public, yet). Bill gave a 'shout out' and 'thank you' to member Darwina Neal for assisting in preparing written remarks about Pershing Park. Member Jim Johnston (author of The Loughboroughs and Yarrow Mamut) will be part of a panel at the Sackler Gallery on Sunday, 2/19 at 2:00 PM on "The Art of the Koran." The museum had to increase room size due to the overwhelming response but will also live-stream it on their web site (asia.si.edu). Speaking of the Sackler Gallery, new AOI Director Barbara Bates had Bill bring to everyone's attention the on-going controversy regarding proposed destruction of the Enid Haupt Gardens at the Smithsonian's main entrance and encouraged everyone to write to express objections to this ill-conceived plan. Kate Meskill and Juliette Smith announced the opening of this year's Hexagon show at Wilson High School. Hayden Wetzel invited everyone to the next Overbeck Lecture.

**Nelson Rimensnyder** challenged everyone with a series of DC history trivia questions:

One regarding the proposed return of the VA portion of the District to the District was by answered by Vernon Tancil. A question regarding the Electoral College numbers in the Bush/Gore election was correctly answered by Larry Feinberg. A third question regarding an equestrian sculpture was answered by Tom Walter. Pat Bitondo correctly identified Samuel Clemens (Mark Twain) in response to a question, and Barbara Ioanes correctly identified the location of one of Alexander Shepherd's residences as being at Connecticut and K, the present location of the Farragut North Metro Station entrance. All 'winners' were awarded with a unique collection of DC memorabilia provided by Nelson.

#### The Day's Speaker:

Bill introduced the day's speaker, John Richardson, AOI Secretary and author of the recently-published "Alexander Robey Shepherd: The Man Who Built the Nation's Capital." Bill noted that John had worked on the book over many years, punctuated by overseas assignments to distant parts of the world.

John started his talk by paying tribute to AOI for

its long support for bringing the Shepherd statue back downtown. John also noted the early Shepherd scholarship of Dr. Philip W. Ogilvie (Past AOI President) and Nelson Rimensnyder (AOI's Historian).

Alexander Shepherd left school at a young age to help the family after his father's death. After a volunteer stint in the Civil War, Shepherd launched a two-pronged political and business career, becoming the fourth wealthiest Washingtonian by 1869 and creating a political movement that led to creation of a territorial government that lasted from 1871-1874. The new government consolidated the three sections of Washington and permitted a systematic, city-wide development program. As head of the board of public works, Shepherd commenced a city-wide program of level-grading and paving streets, laying sewer and water lines, planting trees, and installing gas lights.

The development program achieved most of its results but with catastrophic management and budgetary results that saw Shepherd out of a job and disgraced. He moved his wife and seven children to a remote village in Mexico in 1880, where he spent the remaining 22 years of his life developing a silver-mining operation that never provided him the fortune to permit a triumphant return to Washington. Of the two allegations that have dogged Shepherd's reputation, one is true and one is false. He was indeed racist although typical of his place and time. Concerning personal corruption, Shepherd came out of office far poorer than he went in, and John found no evidence to support the charge.

The next regular luncheon here at the Capitol Skyline Hotel is Friday, March 17th when AOI member and Cherry Blossom expert Anne McClellan will host a panel presentation: "Bonsai -- Stories, Inspiration and Art" with Steven Voss and Sandra Moore ...just in time for spring.
