Q: On Aug. 21, 2017 the Treasury Secretary visited Ft. Knox, the first one in years to do so. What is the approximate value of the gold in Ft. Knox? A:\$190Trillion – **Vicky Crawford** provided the answer after several members crept toward the total.

Q: Terminix recently rated cities for their rat population. Which city was #1? A: Chicago – **Maggie Hobbs** provided the answer.

Q: In 1972 the House Committee on DC entertained a recommendation to include everything inside the Beltway as the 51<sup>st</sup> State. Who proposed this? A: The AOI of DC! **Larry Feinberg** knew the answer.

Q: What presidential candidate, later elected, supported Puerto Rico's independence? A: Eisenhower. John Herron provided the correct answer.

Q: What purpose did Baltimore's Ft. McHenry serve during World War I? A: A hospital...one of the largest and busiest. **Pat Brown's** guest **Maureen Staples** provided the answer.
