

# **FRIENDS OF CLARA BARTON'S MISSING SOLDIERS OFFICE**

*The day before Thanksgiving 1997, Richard Lyons, a carpenter for the US General Services Administration, was cleaning up after a long day's work getting ready for the demolition of 437 Seventh Street, NW, Washington, DC. Peace and quiet had descended upon this otherwise busy downtown corner as workers had abandoned their desks early to prepare for the next days' feast. Now alone on the third floor of the vacant 1864-era government building, Lyons thought he heard what sounded like crying coming from a nearby room. He walked back and forth to locate the sound. Peering up into a shaft of light, he noticed something wedged between the ceiling and attic space and climbed up to get a better look. From the dark recesses, he pulled out a metallic sign that read:*
