President's Message...

Field Trips, the Civil War Sesquicentennial and Partnerships:

AOI kicked off its tribute to the Civil War Sesquicentennial in April with Elizabeth Smith Brownstein's excellent presentation of "Abraham Lincoln's Life in Music." We will continue to celebrate the many historic events associated with the Civil War during the next four years. This month author James Johnston will reveal the memories of Margaret Cabell Brown Loughborough in Richmond and Washington during the war. In June, NPS Park Ranger Alexa Viets will up-date our members and guests with a program dedicated to the preservation and promotion of the District's Circle Fort Parks which during the War protected the Nation's Capital. These are just a few of the programs that we hope will 'connect' AOI members to the sesquicentennial.

On April 29th, AOI member Dr. Mark Ozer and Directors Sherwood Smith and John Richardson took a field trip to the National Museum of Civil War Medicine in Frederick, Maryland.



Just last month my wife, Pat, out-of-town guests and I also visited this wonderful museum and enjoyed its depiction of Civil War life through the recollections of the doctors, nurses, ambulance operators and the injured. It is well worth the 30 minute drive to historic Frederick to visit this site.

If You Were Not At Our April Meeting...

The third luncheon meeting for this year was held at the Channel Inn on April 15th, with President Bill Brown presiding. There were 97 members and guests attending.

A motion to approve the minutes as printed in the current newsletter was made by **Al Wheeler**, seconded by **John Gill**. There were no additions or corrections, and the motion was carried. The reading was dispensed with as part of the motion.

There were six applications for membership since the last meeting. President Brown read the names of the applicants and provided brief information as applicable. Anne Renshaw moved, with second by Bob Proudley, that the applicants be accepted as new members. The motion was quickly passed. The new members are Lt. Col. Edgar Russell, III (a guest last month); Elaine Flynn (a guest last month); Shirley de la Barre (guest of Bonnie Duncan previously); Dr. Cindy Gueli (A.U. History professor, guest of Bob Barbuto previously); Stuart Edwards (nominated by Sally MacDonald); Nancy Hoffer (nominated by Barbara Plummer).

Treasurer Hulit Taylor presented a brief report. There are now 277 members total, of whom 25 are new members. This is consistent with data from previous years. Income from dues and contributions also is consistent with expectations. Expenses in March included \$500 to George Washington University for the Phil Ogilvie Award, and \$250 to the Military Road School Preservation Trust. Investment income is approximately \$1,400 dividends and interest. Hulit concludes this is as planned.

Most important is Hulit's return after missing the last meeting due to illness requiring brief hospitalization. The diagnosis is that the illness is from a measles-like childhood disease, and now Hulit is immune from further occurrences. Hulit expressed thanks and appreciation to all who sent well wishes

during that difficult time for her.

Bill Brown called **John Breen** to come forward. Bill then described John's service as the AOI Fire Department Liaison. John is stepping down from that office after more than 15 years service. Bill thanked John for his service and presented him with a plaque which reads as follows: "The Association of Oldest Inhabitants of the District of Columbia expresses its sincere appreciation to Chief John Breen for more than 15 years service as AOI's Liaison to the DC Fire Department in matters relating to public safety, history, and the preservation and storage of the AOI's collection of antique fire apparatus." John has been a member of AOI for 38 years and was a member of the DC Fire Department for 37 years. His remarks in accepting this award were delightful and informative. The AOI Board feels that there is only one qualified successor for the Fire Department Liaison role. That is AOI member Lt. Jim Embrey, who has agreed to serve.

Bill introduced first timers and guests, and made announcements of interest.

Bill noted the passing of recent member Janice Noel, who died while visiting her son in New York. She will be sorely missed from our group. Bill also mentioned the passing of Ruel Eskelsen who worked for the Historical Society's Kiplinger Library and was a friend known to many AOI members.

Historian Nelson Rimensnyder discussed several topical aspects including Emancipation Day in the District and Lincoln's role. He also noted that April 15 marked the initiation of the Civil War and the surrender of Fort Sumter 150 years ago. He noted that on that day Alexander Robey Shepherd and his brother volunteered for service in the Union Army. Nelson also mentioned the interest in both World Wars and DC veteran's history and provided some fascinating stories

Our featured speaker today was Elizabeth Smith Brownstein, a well known authority on Lincoln who spoke to us a few years ago. That talk followed the publication of her widely read book "Lincoln's Other White House." Today Elizabeth displayed another facet of her extremely interesting multitalented background. Her presentation today was entitled "Abraham Lincoln's Life in Music." She is a very accomplished pianist, and ably demonstrated examples of the music that Lincoln enjoyed, and gave us a rare opportunity to listen to her commentary not only on the songs that she had selected, but also to hear her informed discussion on Lincoln family history, performed with great charm and wit, as well as knowledge of history. She picked the Blue Tailed Fly as the first number based on the Pete Seeger interpretation. This was followed by Ben Bolt, the Last Rose of Summer, Dixie, and then the Mary Lincoln Polka. She concluded with a rousing version of Battle Hymn of the Republic, building to a crescendo exclamation point in music and history for a powerful and very moving finish! It was a wonderful experience.
