# President's Message...

#### AOI's Celebrates Our Centenarian Member

In the early 1990's, the AOI was struggling to survive. "Our late esteemed president, Bill Waters' long siege of illness and injury resulted in protracted inactivity," recalls Past President A.L. Wheeler in 1994. "During this period, many of our members passed along, others lost interest."

In 1993, Palisades's resident and retired highway lobbyist Harold Gray stepped in and together with retired Pepco official Joseph Smith and retired D.C. Fire Department Deputy Chief Joseph Zeis, "rescued us from this abyss," Al concluded.

We celebrated Harold Gray's 100<sup>th</sup> birthday at our September luncheon in 2007 and Harold passed away just shy of his 101<sup>st</sup> birthday. Today, we are graced with our sole centenarian – part of the trio who saved the organization – Joseph Smith. Joe celebrates the centennial of his birth on November 13, 2012.


In 1993, Joe along with Harold and Joe Zeis re-wrote the AOI's by-laws to bring them up-to-date and make them more inclusive. They also researched the organization's Articles of Incorporation and ensured that AOI's IRS status was current. When I joined the AOI in 1995, Joe Smith signed my 'welcome letter' as Membership Chairman.

Since those days in 1993 when these three men worked to reorganize, promote the organization and recruit new members – Sherwood Smith and Seymour Selig clearly recall Harold attending virtually every organization's luncheons, meetings, and events to recruit new members – others such as Jack Henry, Al Wheeler, Jack Hassett, Jan Evans, Joyce Waters (Lindenblad) and Phil Ogilvie continued this tradition to ensure that the AOI remains the viable, relevant and active organization that we enjoy today.

AOI held its October 2012 meeting at the Pier 7 restaurant of the Channel Inn on October 19. There were 84 members and guests in attendance, President Bill Brown presiding.


The draft of the minutes of the September meeting as printed in the newsletter was approved by the membership.

There were two new applications to become members. They are from **Joan V**. **Smith** (nominated by Sally-Beth Bumbrey), and **Ed Kaminski** (nominated by Seymour Selig). **Alan Beach** moved, seconded by **George Hutchinson**, that the applicants be accepted, which was quickly approved.

Treasurer **Hulit Taylor** presented a brief report. There are 351 members. There were no non-routine expenses since the last meeting. Our investment account value as of September 30 reached \$202K, for the first time since 2008.

Bill introduced members and guests.

Our speaker for today is Davis Buckley. He was introduced by AOI member Joe Akers, a long-time friend. Davis Buckley is an architect, and his firm Davis Buckley Architects and Planners is from Washington, with offices on K Street. They have been central to much DC

Service and Congress. They designed the

National Law Enforcement Memorial, for which Davis was the architect.

They also designed the Japanese American Memorial to Patriotism During World War II, which remembers the internment of 120,000 Japanese Americans during the war. They also did the addition to

the FDR Memorial of President Roosevelt

seated in a wheelchair.

The speaker also discussed other aspects of museums and memorials, such as some of the history of Clara Barton's Office of Missing Soldiers, whose site was discovered downtown on 7th Street (below E Street) relatively recently within the past few years. He discussed some of the plans for it. His firm did animations for the GSA on Clara Barton and the missing soldiers, showing some of this history and artifacts from Barton's office. She eventually retired to Glen Echo and lived until age 91. She is buried in Oxford Massachusetts, not far from her birthplace.

There was a good Q&A session at the end of the talk. A fascinating question

concerned the sculpted lions of the National Law Enforcement Memorial. Buckley explained how they were done by Raymond Kaskey, who studied at Yale University with Davis. He then disclosed that Ray had entered Yale to study architecture, while Davis had enrolled for sculpture and fine arts. Ironically Davis eventually became known for his architecture while Ray became known for his sculpture.
