Dear Mr. Brown,

It was a pleasure speaking with you yesterday. I am hoping that you and the AOI might consider our objectives as worthy of your consideration, a way to block re-dedicating the D.C. WWI Memorial, while offering an appropriate course of action to honor Americans who served in World War I. As a new organization hoping to gain traction, we would welcome any assistance you might be able to offer in this regard.

The World War I Memorial Project is a 501 (c) (3) non-profit foundation dedicated to the construction of a national World War I memorial in Washington, D. C. I am the president of the World War I Memorial Project and a history teacher at St. Helena High School in St. Helena, California. Among the classes I teach is an elective history class on WWI. In November 2008 students in this class conducted a filmed interview of Mr. Frank Buckles, who, at 107 years of age, was the last surviving United States veteran of World War I. That interview, filmed at Mr. Buckles' residence in Charles Town, West Virginia, is now part of the Library of Congress Veterans History Project. Our class has its own website ([www.wwiinstitute.org](http://www.wwiinstitute.org)), which describes our goals and projects and displays our original research.

My interest in WWI and the absence of a national WWI Memorial in our nation's capital prompted me to form the World War I Memorial Project. Two other organizations, the WWI Memorial Foundation and the National WWI Museum in Kansas City, Missouri, hope to honor American WWI veterans in a different way:

~The WW I Memorial Foundation hopes to modify an existing memorial and alter its purpose. The memorial in question is the D. C. World War I Memorial, which was built in 1931 and dedicated to the D. C. residents who served in the war. This group hopes to rededicate it as a memorial to all American WWI veterans.

~The National WWI Museum in Kansas City, Missouri, is seeking recognition as the national WWI memorial.

We believe the appropriate course of action, the ideal way to honor our nation's WWI veterans, is not to borrow an existing structure and alter its purpose, but to design, build, and dedicate a new and worthy memorial in our nation's capital. Our bias is against any proposal that would modify an existing memorial and then rededicate it to something other than what the memorial was originally intended to honor.
