# "Casey Trees"

The February 21 luncheon speaker was Gabrielle Rovegno, the Community Education Coordinator for Casey Trees, who gave a professional and well documented talk about Casey Trees and trees in the Washington area more generally. Her talk included the history of trees in the area, starting with Captain John Smith in the early 17th century, noting how tobacco, the dominant regional crop, depleted the soil and required clearing vast areas for new The Civil War brought massive planting. deforestation between the forts protecting Washington, as well as space for parade grounds and soldiers' barracks. In the decade after the war, public works czar Alexander Shepherd planted thousands of trees, some of which still survive. The 19th century, however, saw massive tree removal due to development of roads and buildings; in the last third of the 20th century, some 30% of the area's trees were removed.

In 1999, Betty Brown Casey, founder of Casey Trees, became alarmed at the devastation and made tree restoration and maintenance a personal crusade. She made her farm in Berryville, Virginia, the center of the operation, devoting 720 acres to a tree nursery. Ms. Casey put together a professional staff, backed by hundreds of volunteers, who inventoried Washington's trees as well as maintaining them over the years. As a result, Washington now has 38% tree cover, with the goal of reaching 40% in 20 years.

The speaker identified several crucial roles played by trees: 1) carbon storage, 2) absorption of rainwater, and 3) cleaning the air, aside from their aesthetic value. She pointed out that conservation easements are a way for local owners of open land to obtain tax benefits while insuring that their properties will not be given over to development in future. She said that the Casey Trees website (caseytrees.org) is an excellent source of information and guidance for interested individuals.
