President's Message...

Since 2010 the AOI has sought to call attention to the centennial of the First World War. At the urging of Lee Rogers, we celebrated the 90th anniversary of the World War I 16th Street Tree Memorial on Memorial Day 2010. Inspired by Joe Grano, we turned our attention to the plight of the District of Columbia War Memorial... its deteriorating condition, efforts to re-designate it a 'national' memorial and, instead, turn attention to the existing Pershing Memorial as an existing site worthy of designation as the 'national' World War I memorial in the District of Columbia. Our efforts continue as we support the U.S. World War I Centennial Commission's efforts to rehabilitate and rededicate the Pershing Memorial and encourage programs to promote the centennial of the Great War.

During the ensuing years, the DC War Memorial became more personal as I discovered that two great uncles are memorialized on the memorial.

AOI member Patricia Daly-Lipe, too, had a great uncle who served in WWI. William Hemmick served as a priest/chaplain during the horrific war and went on to serve in the Vatican. Patricia's excellent research and narrative ties together correspondence and interviews which makes this remarkable man's life a story worth hearing.

If You Were Not At Our Last Meeting...

[Draft minutes of our last meeting for approval at the Sept. 19, 2014 luncheon.]

AOI held the fifth meeting of its 149th year at the Capitol Skyline Hotel with 92 AOI members and guests present.

Draft Minutes of the May 2014 meeting were approved as published in the June newsletter, with Allen Beach moving approval and Mary Pat Gaffney seconding.

New members **James McKay** (nominated by Nelson Rimensnyder) and **Tischa Cockrell** (nominated by Phil Pannell) were unanimously approved by voice vote having been moved by Juliette Smith and seconded by Patricia Daly Lipe.

Treasurer's Report: Assistant Treasurer **Cindy Janke** gave the Treasurer's Report, as follows:

- \$500 was given to the Military Road School Preservation Trust.
- The investment account has generated more than \$2500 in interest and dividends.
- The May luncheon had 94 members and guests present.
- AOI's share of the May luncheon was \$491.
- Cindy Janke reported that AOI has 338 members as of this date.

Announcements

Military Road School: **Theresa Saxton** of the Military Road School Preservation Trust expressed the Trust's appreciation of AOI's long-standing financial support, going back to the late Phil Ogilvie, who as AOI President first established the relationship. Ms. Saxton announced that the Trust will present three college scholarship awards at a program at the school at 2:00 PM on Saturday, July 19 and invited all present to attend. Ms. Saxton said she had deposited flyers on the back table for Dr. Frank Cooling's book on Civil War

defenses, as well as for sesquicentennial activities about the

1864 attack on Fort Stevens.

National World War I Commission: **Bill Brown** announced that the National World War I Centennial Commission has officially endorsed restoring/re-designating Pershing Park as the World War I Memorial; D.C. Congressional Delegate **Eleanor Holmes Norton** has co-sponsored legislation to the same end. Bill noted that the late Joe Grano had been the driving force behind this initiative.

St. Thomas Church: **Bill Brown** reported efforts to block proposals to build a seven-story luxury building on the site of the former St. Thomas Episcopal Church (Dupont Circle).

Friends of D.C. Archives: **Bill Brown** reported on the initiative of **Bill Rice, Mary Beth Corrigan, Trudy Peterson,** and others working to protect from budgetary predators the \$44 million budgeted by the D.C. City Council for a new city archives.

Joe Grano: Both **Bill Brown** and **Nelson Rimensnyder** commented on the late Joe Grano's funeral, held in Force, Pennsylvania, which Nelson and Lisa Nickerson attended. He was buried in the cemetery attached to the Catholic Church where his parents, immigrants from Italy, were married. Bill described the process by which Joe's epitaph "Joe used his talents to inspire others to action" came to be put on his tombstone.

Trivia Questions: Nelson Rimensnyder asked a series of trivia questions, the "prizes" for which came from Joe Grano's collection of books and photos:

- 1) Which U.S. President appointed the first black D.C. Commissioner? (Answer: John F. Kennedy)
- Following President Theodore Roosevelt's introduction in 1907 of the idea of Territorial Government for D.C., which President was next to endorse it? (Answer: Dwight D. Eisenhower).



- 3) Which citizen first recommended D.C. height limits to President George Washington? (Answer: Thomas Jefferson)
- 4) Which Founding Father first called for no taxation without representation for D.C.? (Answer: Benjamin Franklin)

The luncheon speaker was Mike Canning, who has recently published "Hollywood on the Potomac," a book about 70 years of feature films from Hollywood studios that have made use of Washington as the setting or backdrop. The entertaining presentation included still photos as well as short clips from several films, including "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington," "No Way Out," "All the President's Men," and "In the Line of Fire." The speaker highlighted what he called "goofs" - accidental or deliberate - most notably "No Way Out's" Georgetown Metro stop (none exists). The speaker commended the accuracy of the U.S. Senate set created for "Mr. Smith" in Los Angeles, an exact replica of the original. The speaker demonstrated an encyclopedic knowledge of his topic, although he appealed – successfully – to the audience to identify the location of a memorable rooftop chase by Clint Eastwood in "In the Line of Fire," promising both use and a citation in the next edition of the book. Juliette Smith correctly identified the location as in the vicinity of the old Tivoli Theater at 14th St. and Park Road, NW. The Q/A time after the talk demonstrated AOI membership's solid grasp of Washington geography.

Bill Brown reminded the audience that today's program ends the AOI program year, although weather permitting, the July 4 Palisades parade will feature the AOI steam pumper, a perennial crowd favorite. The next AOI program event will be in September.
